STOPPING A LEAK.

In case of a sudden leak, when, as usual, it is impossible to get a plumber quickly, if you turn off the water and mix some common yellow soap and whiting with just enough water to make a thick paste, you can stop the leak yourself. It will be found to do temporarily as well as solder, provided you turn the water on again rather slowly, as a sudden rush might force it out, says Today's Magazine. I have used this on two occasions and it asted until a plumber came—a day afterward.

TO MAKE EYELETS.

In making eyelets, when it is not desirable to carry the thread from one to another, adopt the plan, says Needlecraft. Finish the eyelet, then pass the needle along under the stitches on the wrong side about one-third of the way around, and cut the thread. It holds firmly and does not show the fastening.

The woodwork around my kitchen sink became very dirty and I wanted it cleaned and revarnished. This easy method of getting the dirt and old varnish off at the same time was told me and proved to be a boon. The instructions were to make a soft soap from common yellow laundry soap, and when it was nearly cool to stir in one tablespoonful of concentrated lye and one-half cupful of coal oil. When the mixture was like a heavy paste it was ready to be spread over the woodwork with a paint brush. I followed these instructions, letting the soap remain a day and a half, and when I washed it off with plenty of hot water, was pleased to find the dirt and old varnish come with it, leaving the clean wood exposed. When it was dry, I varnished it, and I had a sweet, clean kitchen again, with very little labor.
