DOCTOR WARNS KISSERS.

Much of the poetry and fascination of the ordinary moustache has been scotched by the French scientist, Dr. Pierre Jacques, in his recent researches as to the habits of various bacilli.

It seems that the doctor's daughter recently became affianced to a young officer who had a fine military moustache. Following a custom which even scientists admit is prevalent as between engaged couples, kisses were interchanged between the young pair when opportunities occurred.

After one such opportunity the doctor insisted upon removing the bacilli from his lovesick daughter's lips, and treated them with a reacting agent. He found over 1600 bacilli per cubic millimetre of the solution. This fact caused the doctor to doubt whether he should allow the engagement of his daughter to continue.

The fiance recently had the misfortune to burn one side of his moustache through cigarette smoking, and was obliged to have it completely shaved off. Dr. Jacques seized the occasion to make a further investigation, and found that, after the removal of the fiance's moustache, the number of bacilli was reduced to less than a tenth of the former number.

Obituary

Rev. William L. Tilden died in the early morning hours of Oct. 11, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Chas. F. McGill, of Saginaw Heights. The deceased made his home with this daughter since coming to Oregon from Michigan. The end came rather unexpectedly. Without a struggle, without a tremor, he fell asleep in Christ. Something more than half a century ago, while a young man, the departed was set apart for the Christian ministry in the M. E. Church. His active ministerial career was largely spent in Northern Michigan, where he labored most faithfully and most successfully.

Mr. Tilden was born Dec. 30, 1835 in the southern part of Michigan. His wife was laid to rest June 19, 1908 in their old-time home in Petoskey, Mich. The deceased is survived by a son, Fred E. Tilden of Petoskey, Mich., Mrs. Frank Burt of Vernon, Mich., and Mrs. Chas. F. McGill of Lents.

It is hoped that Rev. A. A. Darling, an associate brother in the ministry whose fields of labor during his active career were near those of the departed, may be able to preach the funeral sermon, assisted by J. M. Nelson, pastor of the Lents Baptist Church. The funeral will be held from the house at 10 o'clock Friday morning. The interment will be in Multnomah Cemetery.
