It developed that Mr. Lind's stay in the capital would be longer than was expected. It is not improbable he will remain here until either a final settlement or a break in the negotiations is recorded.

There was nothing at the American embassy to indicate that a more favorable turn in events is expected and there is reason to believe that an ultimatum, in its full diplomatic sense, soon will be handed to Huerta, the time limit being brief. It is expected this new document will be so written as to bring to an end the relations between the two countries before November 22, the date fixed for the convening of the new congress, unless Huerta sees fit to agree to the terms of the Washington communication.

### **Prompt Adjustment of Money System Demanded**

New York - Jacob H. Schiff, the banker, told members of the Chamber of commerce that the financial system of this country must be adjusted with-Huerta's attitude in the face of Wash- Massachusetts and New Jersey in a short time or a serious situation would result.

"If the currency measure is not properly amended and we get away from the gold which is now in sight." he said,"we will confront very difficult conditions. Partisanship at this time is out of place. What we need is good citizenship.

"I think a great mistake is being made, especially in the East. That is, maintaining the attitude that if we can't get what we want in currency ligislation, we would rather have no change. The pending bill has so much good in it that to say it is all bad is not statesmanship, but partisanship."

Mr. Schiff's speech was an im-promptu one, made after A. Barton Hepburn, president of the Chase National bank, had proposed that a special committee of the Chamber be appointed to go to Washington to bring its influence to bear on the currency legislation situation. The Hepburn resolution was adopted

and the president of the Chamber was empowered to appoint a committee of three to confer with congress "for the purpose of securing as far as possible the amendments to the pending currency measure recommended by this chamber."

#### Women Rule Grand Jury.

Redwood City, Cal.-Women will direct affairs of the San Mateo county grand jury, organized here with eight men and 11 women members. The jury was drawn from a venire of 17 women and 13 men. Judge Buck made the selections, holding that women may serve on juries, although Judge Cabaniss and Attorney General Webb recently have ruled to the contrary. As soon as the jury went into executive session the women elected Miss Diva Belli as secretary, although the men nominated a candidate.

#### Exports of Coal Large.

Washington, D. C .- Coal exportation of Continental United States for 1913 will approximate \$100,000,000. according to figures based upon the exportation for the first eight months of this year, compiled by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. This puts the United States in third place of the coal exporting countries of the world, being exceeded only by the United Kingdom and Germany. In 1903 the year's coal exports amounted to \$27,000,000.
