MILTON LETTER.

MILTON, June 23, 1880.

EDS. LEADER.—Gentlemen: It seems to be impossible for "the people of Pendleton," when in the hands of the manipulators, to do anything without having it tainted with trickery. At first they proposed to have a mass meeting to consider the question of Division; next they "suggested that a convention be held and each precinct be represented by delegates—one delegate to each 50 votes cast for Congressmen, and one for each fraction over 20 votes, Blalock precinct to be entitled to two delegates. This representation is very fair, and I fancy will commend itself to all. If the "people of Pendleton" aforesaid had stopped at that, all would have been well. But they further "recommended that no proxies be allowed." They are evidently anxious to have a "full representation." Forty-seven delegates would be a nice thing to have for a day or two. It has never dawned upon "the people of Pendleton" how much it costs to make a trip to the county seat from the ends of this small county of ours. They have never realized that it is no mean hardship for people to leave their business, lose time and pay out money to an extent that is out of all reason, simply because they are remote from the county seat. Then, again, judging by their conduct in the past, these same "people of Pendleton," headed by "Boltingjimo" would not abide by the decision of any mass meeting or convention that did not allow them to "fix" things. "Rule or ruin" is their motto, and they have been both ruling and ruining the people of this precinct and county too long. If the citizens of Pendleton are in earnest about this matter, let them have a call for a convention with the names of responsible and reliable men attached to it. "The people of Pendleton" who have been connected with every dirty political trick in the county for years cannot expect the people outside of Pendleton to have any confidence in their professions of public good. Let "Boltingjimo" the poll-book snatcher, the tally-sheet manipulators, and all the rest of the political scavengers stand to one side and allow the honest citizens of Pendleton to say what they want to do and they will be met half way by all the voters of the county to decide this or any other question. Men who only provoke the contempt of their fellow-citizens are not the ones to inspire with confidence, and no matter how honest their intentions may be, they will certainly be met with suspicion and distrust.

High Water.

The Columbia is again having a high time of it. The water is about as high as it was in 1876, and is still going up. The railroad between the Upper and Lower Cascades is submerged, thus rendering travel impossible. The company's orders at Walla Walla are not to issue any tickets. This will deprive a great many of the opportunity of spending their money at the State Fair. Walla Walla is at present an Island. The upper river, however, is falling rapidly, and we may soon expect the lower river to follow suit. No freight has been received by the company at Portland for several days; and the merchants are taking every precaution to secure their goods from damage. The general opinion is that the water will attain a greater depth than it did in 1876. Telegraphic communication with Portland is for the time being suspended.

Private dispatches from Buenos Ayres, June 22, states that fighting was going on and that many had been killed and wounded. Dr. Tijeros, governor of the province of Buenos Ayres, has issued a pronunciamiento. The city of Buenos Ayres, has been fortified and armed. The population are fleeing.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The following post offices will be made money order offices from and after the first of August, provided that the respective post master furnish in the meantime the necessary additional bonds, blanks for which will shortly be sent out by the postmaster general:

Oregon—North Yamhill and Dayton in Yamhill county; East Portland, Multnomah county; Centerville, Umatilla; Hillsboro, Washington county, and Independence, Polk county.

Washington Territory—Spokane Falls, Stevens, and Goldendale, Klickitat.

The Commission to ratify the agreement with the Ute Indians received written instructions to-day from the Secretary of the Interior, and started for Denver, whence they will proceed to Los Pinos. Red Cloud, Spotted Tail and the other Sioux chiefs will make another visit to the Indian school at Carlisle, Pa., and will then go direct to Dakota.

NEW YORK, June 26.—There have been 207 deaths in this city the past twenty-four hours, the highest mortality in any one day this year. Total deaths during the past week, 1083. Cholera infantum is very prevalent.
