CATON TO-NIGHT

At Centerville! Raising a Hancock and English Pole! Grand Rally. Everybody invited. Next Monday night at Weston. Republicans, turn out!

From the State capital comes the cheering intelligence that H. B. No. 64 is likely to become law. It may be amended a little, but not enough to interfere with its general provisions.

Conkling's big speech is said to be "his greatest oratorical effort." Able and eloquent a man as Conkling undoubtedly is we have no doubt but what the above is true. The longer the republican party lasts the more effort is required to put it in a fair light before the people.

In the Salem correspondence of the *East Oregonian* of last week appeared an allusion to the wife of president Hayes, which was as boorish and ungentlemanly as it was untrue. It is a pity that that paper does not exercise more caution and endeavor to conform to the recognized rules of politeness and decency.

The U. S. Grand Jury of Trenton N. J., have indicted Chas. H. Voorhees for embezzling the funds of the Hackensack Bank. If the election of President should devolve upon the House, and Voorhees, who is a republican, should in the meantime be sent to the penitentiary, the vote of New Jersey might be tied. The delegation now consists of four republicans, two democrats and one greenbacker. Unless the greenbacker voted with the republicans it would be a tie, should Voorhees be found guilty.

It has been attempted to create a feeling against Hancock by the publication of an interview between a Dr. Fowler and Gen. Grant. Twice already Grant has denied through the Chicago papers that there ever was such an interview or that he ever uttered such sentiments as were in it attributed to him; and still we find the bogus interview going the rounds of the reublican press, but not a word about Grant's denial. These same papers believed the Okolona States, and never saw Wade Hampton's denial of the words put in his mouth by a republican reporter of inventive genius.

The establishment of a mail route between Summerville and Walla Walla is at last receiving some share of attention. A petition signed by citizens of Summerville, Weston, Milton and Walla Walla has been forwarded to the proper authority and we hope to see it speedily acted upon.

Just before the war a great many democrats joined the republican party, simply because they were opposed to slavery. They did not abandon their democratic principles; they carried them with them. Now that the sole object for which they joined that party is accomplished they are returning to their first allegiance. Nothing could be more natural. Hundreds and hundreds have been waiting for an opportunity. Now with Hancock as leader, the time has come.

DEMOCRATIC ECONOMY.

(From the New York Star, Sept. 24, 1880.)

In 1875 the Democrats recovered a majority in the House of Representatives, and they went to work at once to mend the matters of the people. To be sure their work was not available till the year afterward. In 1878 they had both branches of Congress, and the fruit of their labors then became clearly evident. Although Hayes' administration is Republican, yet he has been obliged to obey the law as made by the Democratic Congress.

Let us take a glance at some of these results as a comparison between the last "unadulterated" Radical administration and the administration with a full Democratic Congressional control.

Take, first, the receipts: For 1875, under Grant, the receipts of customs were \$157,167,722; under Hayes they were \$186,522,064—an increase of \$29,354,342. In 1875 the internal revenue receipts were \$110,007,493; in 1880 they were \$124,000,373—an increase of \$13,992,880. In 1875 the total revenues from all sources were \$284,020,771; in 1880 they were \$333,526,610—an increase of \$49,505,839.

Now turn to the expenditures: In 1875 the war department cost \$41,120,645; in 1880, under Hayes, it cost \$38,116,916—a decrease of \$3,003,729. In 1875 the navy cost \$21,497,626; in 1880 it cost \$13,536,984—a decrease of \$7,960,642. In 1875 the Indian Bureau cost \$8,384,656; in 1880 it cost \$5,945,457—a decrease of \$2,439,209. In 1875 the total expenditures were \$278,693,573, and in 1880 they were \$267,642,959—a decrease of \$5,050,614.

This decrease in the total expenditures would have been much larger but for the increase in pension payments in 1880 over those in 1875—the only item in which there was an increase. In 1875 the pension payments were \$29,456,216; in 1880 they were \$56,371,958. Leaving out this pension item the decrease in expenditures would have been \$32,381,552 for the year. This shows the economy practiced by the Democratic Congress, and this is a foretaste of the economy that would rule the councils of a full Democratic government with the executive, the administration and the legislature as one. The matter is worth thinking about.

We are in receipt of the *Evening Breeze*, of Sacramento, Cal., published by Black & Page, from which we call the following, that all may "think their own think." It is full of spicy matter.

The Judge is to-day pleading for a perpetuity of such power by stumping the Willamette Valley for Garfield and Arthur. Williams and the celebrated Hippie-Mitchell are the "big-guns" of the Oregon campaign, and in the language of a republican the other evening, "What a crowd to train with!"

It seems after all that the building of an Insane Asylum is receiving favorable consideration from the hands of the Legislature. "Appropriations" are the "open Sesame" that as if by magic enlist the hungry jobbers to work for the project so zealously. The Asylum under Dr. Hawthorne is the only State institution against the management of which there has never been raised a breath of suspicion. It is a credit to the State. And now this is to be thrown into the jaws of the political alligators!

San Francisco is one of the most governed and worst governed cities in the Union. Quarrels and bickerings among those in power are of almost daily occurrence. Social and political upheavings have disturbed quiet, and brought rascals to the surface. The heterogeneous mass of workmen, democratic and republican are headed by Mayer Kalloch, whose name is in strong reproach. It would be good for that city to fall under some party rule established beyond question, then the people could have at least a temporary rest.

Rutherford B. Hayes having been chosen by the Electoral Commission, which in turn was elected by Congress, it is useless for anybody to rail at him as his "Fraudulency." We believe he was not elected by the people, and further that the Electoral Commission stultified itself in its rulings to return a partisan decision—but the outcome was that Hayes was elected, and he had no legal right to go "behind the Returning Board," i. e. the Commission. But he had a right to say that the Republicans who received a higher vote than he did in Louisiana and Florida, were yet not elected, and "like a little man" he did say it. While he thus tacitly admitted that he, himself, had not been elected by the people's votes, he held to the decision of the Electoral Commission, and we believe he had a right to do so. Let us call him President Hayes.

The Mormons are strongly in the ascendant in Utah, and consequently the two great parties there are Mormon and anti-Mormon. They are running an anti-Mormon democrat there upon whom both great political parties are united. However, they do not expect success, but simply to show their strength. As a move in the same direction, a writ of mandamus was issued out of the Supreme Court to strike women's names from the voters' list, or else show cause. This move was baffled, but they intend keeping on trying. Idaho, it seems, is also getting alarmed at the Mormon increase, as some of the counties are already entirely under their control. The polygamy connected with Mormonism is a foul blot on the national escutcheon, and our great statesman would confer a practical boon on the people by removing, in a legitimate way, this monstrous evil.

One person was killed and twenty injured in a Catholic church in Manchester, England by the giving way of the gallery floor.

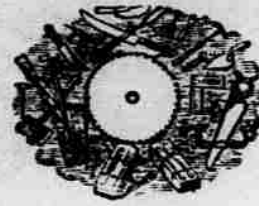
Thirty feet of masonry and an immense amount of rock have fallen in the St. Gothard tunnel. Four men were killed and many wounded.
