Still millions of gold coming from Europe every week.

At Leadville, Mart Deigan shot and killed Louis Lamb on the street.

Gen. Garfield has gone to Washington, and wants no fuss made over him.

In South Africa the troops have been successful in fighting the Basutos.

Small-pox has broken out in Virginia City and five cases developed in two days.

Petroleum exports for nine months have reached \$125,000,000 against \$26,000,000 in 1879.

Irish Bishops notify the Pope that they must in certain events support the Land League.

The Consolidated Imperial mine, Virginia City, was on fire but was got under control with a difficulty.

The Public Produce Exchange, Chicago, has suspended; failure caused by recent heavy advance in grain, etc.

The New York Herald characterizes Col. Ingersoll's assaults on religion as attacks on the civilization of an age.

June 30th there were 250,802 pensions, averaging \$103 each. Total amount paid during the year, \$57,026,994.

Edwin Booth cables to his theater in New York that the Passion Play is not a proper one for the theater, and protests against it.

Several vessels have lately been wrecked near Erie, Pa., on Lake Erie, but all the crew were saved by life-saving crews, who worked nobly.

There is a prospect of the Mississippi river closing at St. Louis. The mercury was from zero, to 10 deg. below at Chicago, and the lake closed.

The extensive barns, etc., of H. McHugh, a few miles from Victoria, with the season's crop, burned Saturday night—loss, heavy; no insurance.

The Czar wants his new half and half wife recognized by the Court and cannot induce his sons and the rest of the family to consent to it.

Republicans talk about excluding James G. Fair from the U. S. Senate on the ground that bribery and corruption influenced elections to the Legislature.

A cold wave has swept over the country and has closed canal navigation in New York State, and at Toledo the lake closed suddenly and prematurely.

The records of the House of Representatives show that Garfield was in Ohio at the date the Morey letter was claimed to be written in Washington.

Now they say that Conkling intends that Gen. Grant shall be Kernan's successor as Senator from New York State. He is bound to have him elected.

Deroth Pasha undertook, by order of the Sultan, to compel the immediate surrender of Dulcigno and had to fall back, as the Albanians concentrated against him.

The Radicals in the French Chamber of Deputies wish to have Judges elected as they are in the United States. The proposition was supported by a large minority.

It is thought the new treaty with China is like the bill the President vetoed and limits the arrival on each vessel so as to restrict laborers while it admits business men.

President Hayes doesn't wish to be a candidate for Senator from Ohio, will not accept it and favors Sherman, whose friends say he has nine-tenths of the Legislature in his favor.

Officers of Democratic clubs in the vicinity of New York denounce John Kelly, and say they will not support the nominees of any convention hereafter that John Kelly influences.

At Ballina, County Mayo, Ireland, an attempt to arrest a Land Leaguer led to a riot, a mob interfered, several police were wounded and they were re-entranced and charged on the crowd.

It is claimed that the Morey letter was an attempt to imitate the writing of Garfield's private secretary, who signs Garfield's name to private correspondence. The forger mistook the secretary's handwriting for his chief's.

Through the failure of the Marshal of the Eighth Indiana District to make returns, Gen. Garfield's plurality is cut down to 377. The returns should have all been in Monday, the 22d. It is thought the Marshal never was notified of his appointment. It came near being a tight shave.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, the increase of revenue from customs; internal revenue, sales of land, etc., amounted to almost sixty millions of dollars. Public money subject to draft June 30, 1879, was \$119,000,000; receipts from all sources, \$494,578,241; drafts paid, \$798,190,000; subject to draft June 30 1880, \$204,683,836.

The Baltimore Gazette gives an account of a novel and great curiosity of the deep known as the sea cow which was taken into that port recently by the steamship Calvert. The animal, which has a head like a cow, lacking only the horns, and the fins and tail of a fish, was captured in the St. Lucie river, Florida. The animal is covered on the head and back by long, coarse hair, the skin being lead colored and very hard. The body is about ten feet in length, is very unyielding and not unlike that of a seal. It is kept in a large tank filled with salt water and is fed hay which it eats with avidity.

THE SABBATH.

Whether the Sabbath institution was or was not created by the fourth commandment, there seems to be in those words, "Thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, nor thy maid-servant," a glimpse of the restful enjoyment which the day of rest, in the primitive conception of it, would bring to the families that keep it.

The day of rest, being rest and not revelry or dissipation, and being therefore a day of home enjoyment, brings with it opportunity for sober thought and conference. A Sabbath-keeping people will become a thoughtful people, and such thoughtfulness is manliness. All men and especially the busy millions in an advanced civilization like our own, need for the mind's sake, not less than for the sake of wearied nerves and muscles, the seventh-day intermission of their ordinary work. A true Sabbath is something for more restful than a day of noisy jollity. In its calm air the mind rests by thought, not thoughtlessness—by quiet musing, by conscious or unconscious retrospection; perhaps, by consideration of what might have been, perhaps by thinking what may yet be, and perhaps by aspiration and resolve toward something in the future that shall be better than has been in the past. The home in which Sunday is a day of rest and home enjoyment is hallowed by the Sabbaths it hallows. In the Sabbath-keeping village life is less frivolous, and at the same time industry is more productive, for the weekly rest. A Sabbath-keeping nation is greater in peace and in war for the character which its tranquil and thoughtful Sabbaths have impressed upon it.

The Watchman says, since Wednesday passenger boats on the upper Columbia run only between Bialock's landing and Umattila, a distance of about eighty miles, the rest of the journey between this and the Dalles is accomplished by rail and before green grass and butter cups grace hill and dale, we will be enabled to make the entire distance behind the iron horse. Passengers leave this city at 6 A. M. and land at the Dalles at 6 P. M., but freight is light. Owing to the low price of wheat, very little leaves the valley. The O. R. & N. Co. is now well prepared to move 400 tons each way per day, yet all they can get, is about 100 tons down and 150 up freight, but better times for both the Company and the people are looming up.
