Ralph Tucker recently delivered a carload of hogs at Athens for the Walla Walla Meat company, receiving six cents per pound.

Sheriff Taylor was up from Pendleton Tuesday, summoning three "good men and true" from this neighborhood for jury service. They are: J. N. York, G. W. Stagg and John M. Price.  
Offered for the second time at administrator's sale at Pendleton Saturday, the residence property of the Elizabeth Price estate at Weston was bid in by Attorney C. H. Carter in behalf of the principal creditors.  
Glenn Morrison, a former Weston boy who has become a sailor, is in San Francisco again with the U. S. S. Maryland, after helping to raise the ill-fated submarine, F-4, in Honolulu harbor. Glenn writes home that the Maryland leaves soon on another voyage to Honolulu, accompanied by two of Uncle Sam's undersea craft.

John G. Richardson lured J. T. Owings of Twin Falls, Idaho, to a sagebrush bottom twenty miles northwest of Pendleton, shot him twice and dumped his dead body into an abandoned well, which Richardson then filled. Driving back to town, Richardson reported that the dead man had returned to Idaho, after selling Richardson his wagon and horse, which the murderer disposed of. After a quiet investigation of the facts, Sheriff Taylor arrested Richardson, who confessed when confronted with a complete chain of circumstantial evidence against him. Richardson formerly farmed in the region where he committed the murder. He says he killed Owings because the latter abused his (Owings') wife, the divorced wife of Richardson. The sheriff thinks that robbery was the true motive.
