ORDINANCE NO. 246.

An Ordinance regulating the speed of automobiles, motorcycles, and all other vehicles propelled by their own power; also regulating the lights on said vehicles.

The People of the City of Weston do Ordain as Follows:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons driving an automobile, motorcycle, or other vehicle propelled by its own power, on any street, alley, lane or other thoroughfare of the City of Weston, Oregon, to drive at a greater speed than fifteen (15) miles per hour within the corporate limits of the City of Weston, Oregon.

Section 2. That all automobiles, motorcycles and other vehicles propelled by their own power shall be equipped with proper head lights and rear lights when the said vehicles are being driven within the corporate limits of the City of Weston, Oregon, at night and the said head light and rear lights shall be kept burning at all times when the said vehicle or vehicles are being operated at night.

Section 3. That any person or persons violating the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof before the Recorder of the City of Weston, Oregon, be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, or be imprisoned not less than two (2) days nor more than twenty (20) days in the City Jail; and any person or persons violating the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance shall upon conviction before the Recorder of the City of Weston, Oregon, be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars or be imprisoned not less than two (2) days nor more than ten (10) days in the City Jail.

Section 4. All vehicles mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be properly equipped with valid license. Any person or persons violating this section shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dol-
