LABOR WILL PROFIT BY ROAD BOND ISSUE

To the Editor:

One word more on the Barret-
Harrah-Vert propaganda against Good
Roads and the Bond Issue.

These men who control the various
organizations, the names of which
they use in their advertisements, are
wealthy land owners. They have
made their fortunes in Umatilla coun-
ty. They have lived here many years.
But during all these years not one of
these men has ever gained any noto-
riety for his philanthropy, progressiv-
ness or personal endeavors toward the
betterment of the county as a whole.
Never a movement has been inaugu-
rated by these men nor one in which
they have interested themselves un-
less its ultimate object was a personal
gain to them.

And now these men want to dictate
to the people of Umatilla, Hermiston,
Stanfield, Echo, Melix, Pilot Rock,
Milton, Freewater and the whole
county as to what they shall or shall
not do in regard to the Bond Issue.

These men are the millionaire
wheat farmers who want to see no
progress or development in the coun-
ty. They want the taxpayers of the
county to go on spending all the tax
money in building them a macadam
road and in maintaining it. They have
a road—the only good road in the
county—and they want no more road
roads built because it would not per-
sonally benefit them. They have no
interest in any part of the county ex-
cept that which their lands are lo-
cated and since the roads to be built
by the bonds do not criss-cross the
wheat belt and give them perfect
roads, they are making the mistake-
ment that the Bonds mean increased
taxes and high cost of living, when in
fact the Bonds mean less taxation and
a lower cost of living because the
roads will provide more adequate and
cheaper means of transportation and
communication to the entire county.

They say "Protect the Widow's
Mite." When before in their long
years of money-making did these men
ever consider the widow and her mite?
Have they protected her mite and ac-
cumulated individual fortunes at the
same time? This is the way they pro-
tect the widow's mite, by going round
and asking the poor people to donate
money to them to be used in putting
on a campaign against the Bond Is-
sue. Why don't they put up this
money themselves? They have plenty
of it. In fact, the people, the de-
stute people would like to see nothing so
much as these men spending a few
dimes of their many thousand dollars.
In fact, they would like an opportu-
nity to get some of this money in cir-
culation.

They also appeal to the laborer.
What have they ever done for the
laborer? The laborer is the bane of
their existence. In fact, they are
continually endeavoring to so perfect
their operations that they can do
away with the laborer entirely. The
Bond Issue means that the laborer will
get \$300,000.00 of the issue, for that

the widow's mite in the least.

penant.

They are not conservationists. They

Sunday to win half a dozen games.
When they might as well have saved
part of them for Pendleton and Echo.
Brill got by against Pendleton a
week before with a damaged wing, but
he couldn't repeat against the Pirates.
They enjoy and utilize sore arms in
opposing slabmen. They likewise

enemy players and rooters. They
don't know how to quit when they get
started. To see them chase them-
selves around the circuit and coming
home two or three at a time, bringing

They began at once to hammer

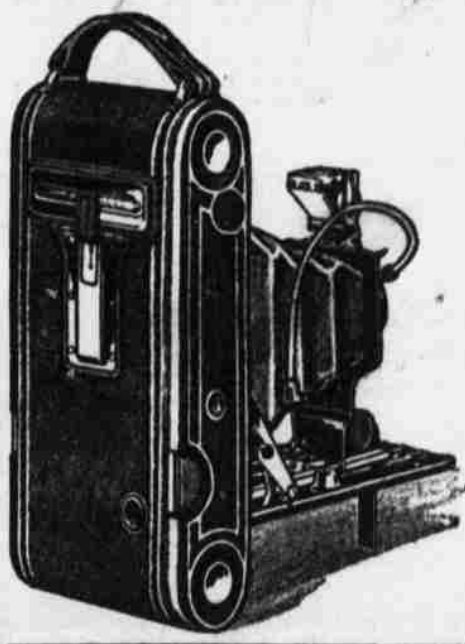
