PARTY SUFFRAGE RECORDS.

Only Democratic Congressmen Appealed For Action.
Congressman C. C. Dill of Washington cites the records of the committee hearings on suffrage in congress to prove that "the only congressman who has gone before the judiciary committee of congress this year to ask that a suffrage amendment be voted upon have been Democratic members." He adds that "no others have appeared to ask for consideration of the measure. That is, I think, sufficient answer to any claim that the Democratic party opposed woman suffrage."
This record need only be supplemented with the personal voting history of the rival presidential candidates to show who is the real friend of suffrage. President Wilson made two trips from Washington to New Jersey to register and vote for woman suffrage when it was submitted in his state. Candidate Hughes did not take the trouble to register or vote the same year—1915—when the suffrage amendment was submitted in his state.

The SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of Sec. 22, Twp. 4 N., R. 37, E. W.
