The reservation land dispute of J. W. Maloney and Frank Rogers will be aired today in the circuit court at Pendleton. A special venire of jurymen has been called for that day to hear the case.

The Weston schools were closed for three days during the week to permit the teachers to attend the institute at Pendleton. The Young America of Weston would doubtless, if need be, go unqualifiedly on record as endorsing teachers' institutes and advocating their greater frequency.

A local organization of business men to be known as the Weston Welfare club is under way and will be completed next Tuesday evening. Twenty or more citizens were present at last Tuesday's meeting and embarked in the movement with much enthusiasm. Constitution and by-laws were adopted and officers will be elected at the next meeting.

In two days of balloting the straw vote taken by Herman Goodwin for the Rexall druggists resulted as follows: Wilson 43, Hughes 28. This would seem to indicate that the Weston community, which is generally Republican in its political tendencies, is this year going for the Democratic presidential candidate. The Rexall vote for the entire country, so far as reported, is as follows: Wilson 107,288, Hughes 80,519. While Wilson leads by more than 25,000 in the popular vote, the electoral vote is given by the Rexall people as follows: Hughes 266, Wilson 265. The great pivotal state of New York gives Hughes 12,905 and Wilson 11,314.
