

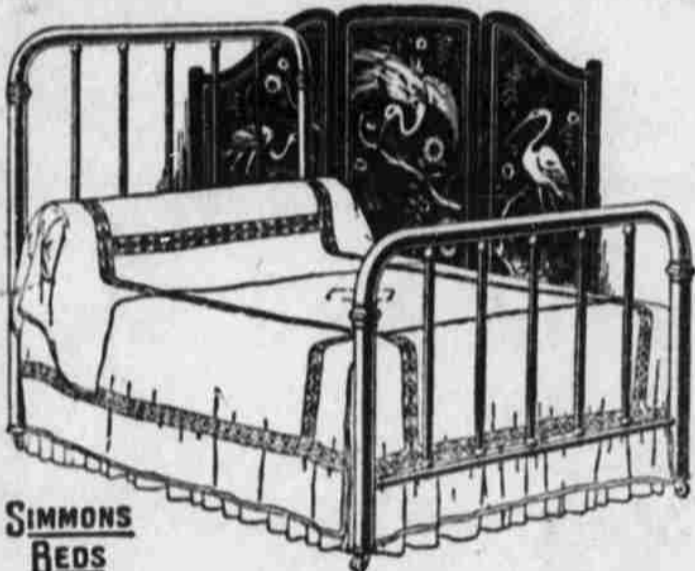

### WESTON BAND WILL GIVE FIRST CONCERT

The Weston Concert band announces its first popular concert for next Friday evening, December 29, at Weston opera house, beginning at eight o'clock. The band will be assisted by Lela G. Saling, soprano. Below is the program:

Mr. A. W. Lundell, the band's director, says of the occasion:

"In putting on this first concert by the Weston Concert band, there are two things I wish to bring to the notice of the people of Weston—first, that the band has now reached a point where its musical offerings have attained a standard that must appeal to all lovers of good music; second, the need of money to finance the further development of the band. As an organization it now has invested about \$2300 in instruments, uniforms and music, and it has also managed to pay a salary to its director. This has been a heavy load for the members, and therefore we are now asking the people of Weston and the public in general to come forth and help us raise funds to carry on the work. You will get good value for your money and you will encourage the boys to still further efforts. We earnestly hope our people will do their part in this first real concert and that this will be but the beginning of periodical entertainments by the band."
