CRUISER MILWAUKEE GIVEN UP FOR LOST

Eureka, Cal.—The United States protected cruiser Milwaukee, which went ashore on Samoa Beach, near here, cannot be floated, it was announced here by J. D. Fraser, expert mechanical engineer, who at the solicitation of Lieutenant W. F. Newton, in command, made a complete survey of the stranded cruiser.

Fraser, using candles to light the way, and accompanied by Lieutenant Newton and members of his staff, penetrated every portion of the war vessel possible and on his return to shore said absolutely there was no chance of floating the ship.

The stranded submarine H-3, which went ashore here December 14, to which the Milwaukee had attached a cable when she went on the beach, has been abandoned by navy salvors, it was announced.

Had the Milwaukee been able more quickly to cast off the steel cable running to the submarine she might have been saved, it was admitted by navy men.

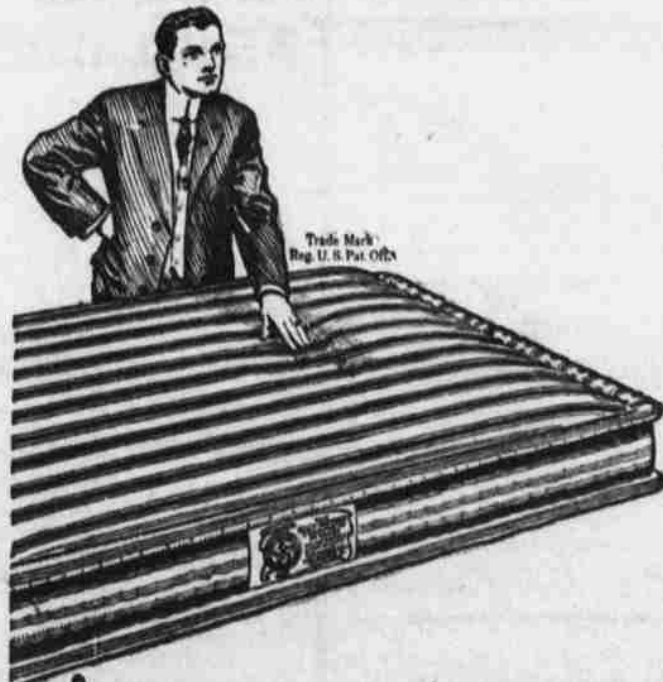
