Frank H. Richmond had the distinction recently of selling wheat at the highest price, \$2.18 per bushel, ever reached by that cereal in Walla Walla. He disposed of one thousand sacks, and Dement Bros. were the purchasers.

The little daughter, aged two years, of Mr. and Mrs. Sloan Thompson was nearly stung to death by bees at their home near Echo. A pair of coveralls was all that saved the child, and her mother was also severely stung in effecting her rescue.

The Weston brickyard began its season's run last week, and put in a day and a-half before the rain interfered with operations. This week the yard is again quite a bit wet. When the force has been recruited to its full strength, eighteen men will be employed.

The pioneers' reunion committees met Saturday and organized for their work by the election of S. A. Barnes as general chairman and J. W. Porter as general secretary. A mark of \$320 was set for Chairman W. H. Gould of the finance committee, this being the sum total of the estimates submitted for carrying out the different features of the reunion.

S. V. Knox, a pioneer lawyer of Weston, was conveyed to the county hospital Wednesday for care and treatment. He has been in failing health for a number of years and had reached a condition of utter helplessness. Himself confined to bed with illness, Mrs. Knox has been unable to give her husband the attention he constantly needed, and the Knox household has been receiving aid from the county and from kind-hearted neighbors. Mr. Knox is thought to be a centenarian, although he never would tell his age. In early years he had a good practice at Weston, but sustained business and property losses in the first big fire here which he was never able to recoup.

Preliminary work is now in progress for the great fills to be made by the O-W. R. & N. Co. on Pine and Dry creeks to replace three high trestles. The company is repairing the trestles, and the fills will be made under contract by Grant, Smith & Co. of Portland. Two large camps will be established, one of them not far below Weston and the other on Dry creek, and it is expected that one hundred men or more will be employed for the remainder of the year. Two cars of horses have already been shipped in for the work. It is reported that Downing hill, the highest point on the line between Pendleton and Walla Walla, will be cut down to supply filling material.
