The news comes from Pendleton that arrangements are already under way for hard surfacing ten miles of the Wild Horse road. At a meeting held Tuesday in Portland, the state highway commission promptly made good on its promise to this county. This work will constitute the first section of the trunk road through Umatilla county, which will profit greatly by the passage of the bonding act.

At a price of \$87,665.95, H. C. Rosenburg, well-known Pendleton farmer, has purchased from Frank and Manuel Pedro 5444 acres of land in the Coomb's Canyon district, north of Nye. A large part of the land is being farmed. Loren Seward has bought three sections and a fraction of the old Prospect farm from H. L. Moody for \$45,000. A third transaction is the sale of the interests of C. E. Zerba in about a section of land northeast of Helix to M. W. Hansell and wife, of Athena, for a consideration reported to be around \$25,000.
