### JOHN ENGLISH IN PARADISE (PARADISE, NEVADA)

The Leader man has a personal letter from John R. English, government surveyor, which we will abuse his confidence by publishing—as John's movements are of considerable interest here. He writes:

"Please send my Leader to Paradise, Nevada. With each camp move McDermitt is getting farther away, and Paradise is four days' journey across country. You can guess how irregular our mail is, and how eagerly the home paper's arrival is awaited. We have settled down to the monotony of camp life on the barren sage plains of southeastern Malheur county, away from the war's excitement. Our greatest worry is how we are to get to town to celebrate the Fourth. McDermitt is a wide open Oregon-Nevada town. The state line runs right through two of the saloon buildings, and in the Nevada end of the room you can see piled on the gambling tables more money than there was in the potato business last year. This is the bootleggers' headquarters. Race horses from three states are already coming in for the big annual Fourth of July race meet and one local pugilist is taking on all comers. Nevada is the only state wherein racing and fighting are now sanctioned, and the day of the celebration will see fortunes change hands.

"The surveyors will probably have to be content with shooting at sage hens. They are as plentiful here as robins on the Weston uplands and as tame as Plymouth Rocks. Sheep herders and an occasional cattle man are about the only humans they saw before we came. We do not kill them because it is the closed season and the old ones are too tough. The boys saw a bunch of antelope yesterday."

Mr. English is preparing to apply for entrance into the second camp of the Engineers Officers' Reserve Corps.
