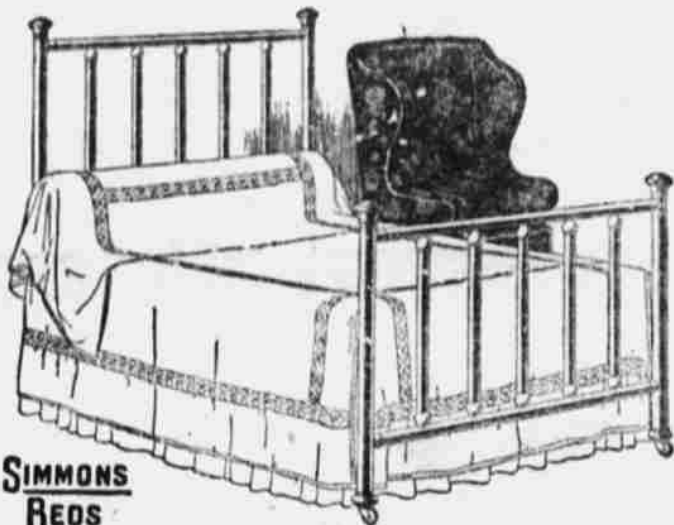

R. J. Lord, a Spokane miller, has estimated the wheat crop of Washington, Oregon and Idaho at seventy million bushels.

After a month's visit with her parents at Weston, Mrs. G. H. Fontaine and little sons left Sunday on their return home to Highroad, Montana.

Ray Gallaher, formerly of Weston, has been sued by his wife, Lela May Gallaher, for divorce. She alleges drunkenness. They were married ten years ago at Walla Walla.

Allison Wood came up from Stanfield July 4th to play clarinet at Athena with the Weston band, and took occasion to compliment the band highly on the excellence of its bass section.

Dr. J. A. Best, mayor of Pendleton and former Weston mayor, has enlisted in the medical corps of the United States army and in a few weeks will receive his commission as first lieutenant.

R. F. Johnson was in town from the Fairview uplands Monday and brought a favorable report of crops in that neighborhood. Although seeded late, wheat and barley are coming right along. Strawberries were thought to be done for by the frosts, but came through nicely and are nearly ready for picking.

Contractor S. T. Gore is here from Walla Walla constructing a new barn, 40x50 feet with gambrel roof, on the Anson Woods place. He will also build a gravity elevator for Mr. Woods—12x48 feet, cribbed construction, four bins, having 7000 bushels capacity. When this work is finished Mr. Gore will build a \$5000 residence for Alex Kirk at Athena.

Up-to-The-Times Magazine: The Weston Milling Company, Weston, when its improvements are all installed, will have a capacity for turning out daily 50 barrels of flour, along with a variety of cereals and other milling products. An up-to-date general utility plant is the idea of Proprietor Robbins, who is a man of enterprise as well as some financial means.

Musical Mention in Up-to-The-Times Magazine: "Miss Bernice Richmond, contralto, pupil of Elias Blum, director of the Whitman Conservatory of Music, appeared in recital for graduation last month and acquitted herself with much honor. Residents of the Pine creek uplands have already raised more than their quota, \$500, for the proposed change in the Pine creek road. Weston is expected to subscribe another \$500, and the remaining \$2000 necessary to make the road will be appropriated by the county court. J. P. Licuallen, committeeman appointed by the Weston Commercial club, was in town this week soliciting subscriptions.

Herman O'Hara, Weston boy who is in training at the Officers' Reserve camp, Presidio, writes that the life there is strenuous but interesting. The recruits have nine hours a day of drills and lectures and two hours of study each night. However, they have Saturday afternoon and Sunday off, to do with as they please. Herman has put in an application for the Aviation Corps, and if it goes through all right he will be transferred to Berkeley.

A number of Weston residents have been losing small chickens of late from a mysterious ailment. The mystery is solved by a recent bulletin issued from the O. A. C. Experiment Station at Corvallis, which says: "Cockle seed is poisonous to poultry and if eaten in any quantity will cause extreme sickness and death. This fact was ascertained in an investigation of the death of a number of small chickens whose intestines showed symptoms of poisoning."

George Purdy had a narrow escape from death Saturday while working on the O-W. fill below town. It was Mr. Purdy's task to look after the heavy iron cement bucket, and while his attention was momentarily attracted elsewhere he thought it had descended. He was looking into the pit when down came the bucket. He dodged in time to escape death, but the bucket struck his head a glancing blow and knocked him cold. When consciousness returned it was found that a slight wound on the cheek was his only injury.
