## Democracy Can Be Made Safe by Giving Every Man His Fair Share

I REMEMBER reading about a year ago, while we were still neutral—the neutrality that Pontius Pilate might have envied—reading from Reventlow and one or two others the fact that they intended that the United States should pay the expense of this war.

We are fighting for America, we are fighting for our own liberty, for our own rights, and while we want to help in every way with railroad experts, with the Red Cross, with food, with cargo ships, with money, we want to put our own fighting men into the line, OR WE WILL NOT DESERVE TO RANK AMONG FREE MEN WHEN THE WAR IS ENDED.

It is the man with sword girt on thigh that ultimately must win the respect of mankind. Let him never draw it in a foul cause or undeservedly against the weak, but he is beneath contempt if he hesitates to draw it against the strong when the strong may wrong him.

Minimize the chances of war by minimizing the injustices which must be overcome. And let me say also that, having done that, it remains for us to make democracy safe in our own country.
