

Last year he had 36 bushels to the acre of Marquis wheat from a small tract of land which the preceding season had averaged 103 bushels of oats. In view of the early maturing of this variety, it is regarded as especially adapted to the uplands, Moreover, it grades high and command the top price in the market.
