Seven gunny sacks full of beans were harvested by Frank Skinner, chief of police, from a single acre at his place above town. Legume is evidently Frank's middle name.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Wurzer returned Monday from Odessa, Wash., where they have been looking after their crop interests. Their son Alvah enlisted September 22 in the Field Artillery, and is now at American Lake cantonment.

Company E of the Second Idaho, now at Charlotte, N. C., is reported to have been assigned to the Army Engineers. This is the company to which a quartet of Weston boys, Blomgren, Barnes, Kennard and Kirkpatrick, belong.

Nat Hale and Fred Voght have returned from Alberta, where they were profitably employed during the harvest season. They would have staid longer, but were driven home by the wet—this referring strictly to climatic conditions.

Some interesting specimens of Soudan grass, representing the first and second cutting, are on display at The Farmers Bank of Weston. They were raised by Jack Chapin, who likes to make an occasional experiment. Jack finds soudan grass to be a good forage crop.

Allison Wood came in a few days ago from Stanfield and will spend the winter in Weston. Just at present he is juggling wheat sacks in the Pacific Coast Elevator company's warehouse, and finds this a congenial occupation. Allison has resumed his whilom seat in the clarinet section of the local band room, and again vainly seeks to drown out the bass.

Zane Lansdale, who has been following the profession of civil engineer at Chicago and Elgin, Illinois, since his graduation from the Oregon Agricultural College, enlisted lately in the Engineers Corps of the United States army—thus giving Weston another representative in the service. He expects to be on the way to France in a few months. Mrs. Lansdale will make her home with relatives in Portland.

Within 87 days from the time it was planted in the early part of June, W. L. Rayborn's Marquis wheat was in the shock at his place on the Weston uplands. Although only one light shower of rain had fallen to give it moisture, it produced 25 bushels to the acre of nice, plump wheat. Last year he had 36 bushels to the acre of Marquis wheat from a small tract of land which the preceding season had averaged 103 bushels of oats. In view of the early maturing of this variety, it is regarded as especially adapted to the uplands. Moreover, it grades high and commands the top price in the market.

Fire of unknown origin Monday afternoon destroyed the C. H. Nelson barn and garage on east Main street hill. Fortunately the wind carried the flames away from the large residence of Mr. Nelson nearby, which escaped. Young men climbed to its roof, and were ready with fire extinguishers should the shingles become ignited. Nothing could be done to save the barn, as the town's supply of fire hose was insufficient to reach from the nearest hydrant, several hundred yards away. Aside from a quantity of lumber which the crowd managed to remove, the two buildings and contents were a total loss. They were valued at about \$1200, and were not covered in the insurance policy, which was found to include only the house and contents.
