A rousing and patriotic Liberty Bond meeting was held in Weston Wednesday afternoon. Strong speeches were made by Hon. J. W. McCulloch of Ontario, State Senator Walter M. Pierce of La Grande and C. A. Miller, federal reserve bank representative of San Francisco. Senator Pierce made an especially fervent and effective appeal. Judge Lowell, chairman of the bond committee in this county, presided. Patriotic hymns and songs were led by a lady singer from Pendleton, and the Weston Concert Band played stirring airs. The rally stimulated local subscription.

A "jitney dance" will be given at the Athena opera house Saturday evening, October 27, for the benefit of the Red Cross—the event having been postponed a week because of the masquerade at Weston, tomorrow evening. The date of October 27 had been set for the annual Library Ball at Athena, but was given over to the Red Cross. Mrs. Sabina Morton, organizer of the Red Cross in this county, will be hostess of the occasion, and Mrs. Hattery of Pendleton, county president, will attend.

Luke Read, well known Athena farmer and a son of Mrs. Martha Read of this city, has been brought home from a Portland hospital in a very critical condition, and it is feared that he cannot recover. A tubercular affection of his throat has developed, following the excision of his tonsils.

Charles Marshall and Milt Swaggart managed to upset a load of hay on level ground while driving into the barn lot at the Swaggart farm. Both sailed into the atmosphere and landed on opposite sides of a fence. The earth shook from the impact, but the casualties were luckily light.

Old sidewalks on Main street are already being torn up in preparation for concrete work. Councilman Saling has rigged up a barrel-like affair for handling the cement that looks like a better mixer than a wise politician.

ORDINANCE NO. 253

Declaring the necessity of constructing a sidewalk on both sides of Main Street between Washington Street and Broad Street, and on the south side of Main street between Broad Street and Armar Street in the City of Weston; approving plans, specifications and estimates filed by the Engineer of the City; declaring the cost of constructing such sidewalk to be a charge and lien against all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by construction thereof, and declaring that the owners of said lots, parts of lots and parcels of land shall be liable for the cost of construction of said sidewalk and directing that a notice of the said plans, specifications and estimates be served upon the owners of said lots, parts of lots and parcels of land of the filing of said plans, specifications and estimates, and appointing a time and place for hearing objections thereto, and finally settling the same, and declaring an emergency.

Whereas, Pursuant to an ordinance of the City of Weston heretofore duly passed E. E. Sauze, Engineer of said City, has made and filed with the Recorder thereof plans, specifications and estimates for the construction of a sidewalk on both sides of Main Street between Washington Street and Broad Street, and the south side of Main Street between Broad Street and Armar Street, in said City, showing the kind and character of improvements contemplated, with the estimates of the work to be done and probable cost thereof, with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the proportion of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived therefrom; and

Whereas, Said Council has examined such plans and specifications, and approved the same, and found the estimates to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work; and

Whereas, The property reported in said estimates with plans and specifications as being the property benefited by such improvement is, in the judgment of the Council, in truth and in fact specially benefited thereby, and the real property aforesaid is the property which

should bear the burden of paying for the said improvements and should have a lien placed thereon for the same, in the proper proportion to each lot, part of lot or parcel of land as shown in said estimates; and

Whereas, The improvement hereinbefore described for said portion of Main Street at this time is proper and necessary; therefore

The People of the City of Weston do Ordain as follows:

Section 1. That it is necessary and expedient at this time to build and construct, and it is hereby ordained and declared that there shall be built and constructed in the City of Weston aforesaid, a sidewalk in all respects as shown and provided in the plans, specifications and estimates prepared by E. E. Sauze, Engineer of said City, and filed with the Recorder on the 16th day of October, 1917, which plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to and are now here again ratified, approved and adopted.

Section 2. That the cost of building and constructing such sidewalk shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement as shown in and described in said plans, specifications and estimates, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land so specially benefited by said improvement shall be respectively liable for the payment of the cost of constructing the same, in the proportion as shown in said estimates; and each lot shall pay and be liable for the payment of the sum of money set opposite to and assessed against such lot, part of lot or parcel of land as shown in said estimate, unless and except such assessment against such lot be hereinafter changed by ordinance of said City.

Section 3. That 2 o'clock p. m. on the 28th day of October, 1917, is fixed as the time and this Council Room as the place when and where any person owning or interested in any of the real property described in said estimates so filed with the Recorder shall appear before the Council to present any objections which such person may have to the amount of such estimates, and at that time and place the Council aforesaid shall after a full hearing of the matter, determine in what if any respect the estimated charge against any lot or

parts of lots or parcels of land shall be changed from the figures and amounts shown chargeable against the same in said estimate; and the Recorder shall notify the owners of all the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land described in said plans, specifications and estimates by sending to each of them at their last known address a written notice, signed by himself as Recorder, with the seal of said City attached, informing them of the time and place fixed in this ordinance for hearing any objections to said estimates which any person may have, and at that time and place said estimates shall be finally fixed and determined by the Common Council, which notice shall be served upon said persons by sending to them through the United States mail with postage thereon fully prepaid, to each of said persons at their last known place of address; at least ten days before the time fixed for hearing such objections to the estimates, and shall be posted in the Council Room of said City, and in three public places in plain view of all persons in the City of Weston for such time.

Section 4. Inasmuch as the present sidewalk along said portion of Main Street is in bad condition, and persons passing along the same are liable to be injured and the City subjected to suits for damages, and the winter season is approaching, which may prevent said sidewalk from being constructed unless the same is commenced without delay, until the spring of the next year shall open, it is necessary for the peace, health and safety of the City of Weston and the inhabitants thereof that this ordinance take effect as soon as possible; an emergency is declared to exist, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.
