## WESTON TAKES \$32,000 OF SECOND LIBERTY LOAN

Weston subscribed \$32,000 to thu econd Liberty Lean an amount which exceeded its minimum quota but was less than its maximum.

Umatilla county subscribed 96 percent of the maximum, Echo, Pendleton and Helix leading in the order named. Each of these three towns exceeded its maximum.

Given a maximum of thirty millions, Oregon raised twenty-five millions more than half of which was taken in Portland. Benton county exceeded and Union and Wallowa counties reached the maximum. The little town of Powers in southern Oregon led the entire state with a subscription of 623
