Glass Found in Bread

Upon cutting open a loaf of bread bearing the printed wrapper of the Model bakery, Walla Walla, last Sunday, Mrs. Sarah McDougal, one of Weston's oldest pioneer residents, discovered glass particles in the middle of the loaf. She informed her son, S. A. Barnes, who at once notified the authorities. The case is now being investigated by federal agents.
It was subsequently reported that Mrs. M. E. Webb of this city and John Phillips, residing on Dry creek, had found glass in similar loaves, but as the bread was fed to chickens these cases could not be substantiated.

There seems to be no disposition here to blame the Model bakery proprietor, a statement in whose behalf appears elsewhere. It is said, however, that the Model bakery has admitted the public freely into its bread-making room and that this is quite a common practice among bakers. In this event, it is regarded as quite easy for an alien enemy to salt the bread with glass and escape detection.
So far as known here, no arrests have as yet been made.

Service and Honor Flags

A community service flag in honor of Weston soldiers, and a Liberty Loan Honor flag, were hoisted Wednesday evening from the local flag pole.

An impressive and appropriate ceremony was held and was largely attended. The program was under the direction of J. W. Porter and included band music, invocation by Rev. E. F. Wriggle, general singing of "America," selection by the Weston Men's Chorus and a brief address by Clark Wood. Four veterans of the civil war, Allen Richal, James Kirkpatrick, C. F. Bulfinch and L. S. Wood, attended as a guard of honor.

The service flag holds 40 stars. Together with the Liberty Loan Honor flag it makes a beautiful appearance beneath the Stars and Stripes. Weston was among the first towns on the coast to receive an honor flag, having gone over the top in one day with a percentage of 125.

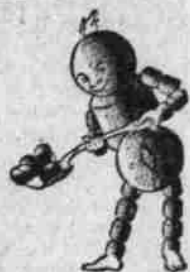
