DAVE READ MEETS DEATH IN SHOTGUN ACCIDENT

Dave Read was killed at Gardena Tuesday by the accidental discharge of an automatic shotgun.

Mr. Read had gone out to the rural mail box, and as was his custom carried the gun with him for the purpose of shooting jackrabbits. No one witnessed the accident, but from the position of the body when found it was evident that he sat down to read his mail and rested the gun on his knee. In

some unknown manner the weapon was discharged and the load of shot penetrated his abdomen. Letters and papers were scattered about the body.

Mr. Read was 47 years old and was known as an industrious and worthy citizen. Less than six weeks ago his wife died and was buried at Weston. He is survived by five children, three of whom are married. He was born in Joplin, Missouri, and came to Weston with his parents in 1883. His boyhood was spent here and he afterward farmed in Wallowa county. Not long ago he bought a place at

Gardena. The remains were brought to Weston, and funeral services were conducted at the United Brethren church Thursday afternoon by Rev. W. S. Payne.
