MEMORIAL HALL IN STORE FOR WESTON COMMUNITY

Joint Committee Decides Upon the Weston Opera House.

At a joint committee meeting Wednesday afternoon, it was voted unanimously to purchase the Weston opera house, which may be had—along with its chairs and other equipment—for \$1200. It is planned to rebuild the opera house front and to have a corner entrance with double doors. The stage will be moved forward eight or ten feet, with the view of using it for the double purpose of stage and dining hall. Among the new equipment to be bought immediately are a motion picture machine and a piano.

The new front will be of attractive design and will be built diagonally. Additional ground needed will be donated by Watts & Rogers. The enterprise will be financed by the sale of memberships in the Memorial Hall association. G. W. Staggs headed the list this morning with a subscription of \$100. The institution is to be the property of the entire community of Weston.

White for the entire building—outside and in—is the color most favored by the committee members.

The joint committee was organized by the election of S. A. Barnes as chairman and Mrs. C. H. Smith as secretary. Others present were Mrs. E. O. DeMoss, Mrs. R. Morrison, F. C. Greer, E. C. Rogers, Dr. Watts, F. C. Fitzpatrick and Clark Wood. Rogers was appointed to head the soliciting committee. Wood, Fitzpatrick and Mrs. DeMoss were appointed as a committee to draft and submit constitution and by-laws.

The movement for a soldiers' and pioneers' memorial building in Weston took definite shape at the commercial club meeting Monday evening, when it was combined with a similar movement for a community hall. The proposition that both be under one roof met with pronounced favor.

The commercial club was visited by a delegation of seven ladies from the Saturday Afternoon club, which included Mrs. E. M. Smith, president; Mrs. E. O. DeMoss, Mrs. C. H. Smith, Mrs. W. S. Price, Mrs. R. Morrison, Mrs. F. D. Watts and Mrs. J. H. Williams. They reported through their spokesman, Mrs. DeMoss, that a proposed community hall had met with unanimous favor at a recent club meeting. President Porter appointed a committee consisting of Clark Wood, F. C. Fitzpatrick and Dr. Watts to consult with the committee of club women. A motion prevailed that both committees meet and cooperate with the memorial building committee. Tuesday morning a tour of inspection was made, to see if any suitable location offered that would meet the needs of the movement. The memorial committee was represented on this trip about town by S. A. Barnes and E. C. Rogers.

In general the plan embraces a community gathering place where public meetings may be held, social evenings enjoyed under the direction of local matrons acting alternately as hostesses and motion pictures presented. A suitable department will be devoted to the display of pioneer relics and soldier trophies in cases and cabinets. There will also be a kitchen and banquet hall for occasional community "feeds."

In view of general and hearty approval accorded the movement, confidence is felt that present activities will crystallize in early action.
