County officials were represented at Weston during the picnic by Sheriff Taylor, Judge Marsh and Assessor Strain. Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Marsh were also here.

Orval Duncan and family were up from Portland for a picnic visit with relatives and friends in the old home town. Orval is employed in one of Max Hoyer's big mills at Portland.

The city council Monday evening let the contract to Fred Pittman for laying 2000 feet of steel water main on Broad street. His bid of \$385 was the lowest of three submitted. The work is to be completed by July 11.

A cordial invitation is hereby extended to the people of your vicinity to join with us in making this a real homecoming celebration."

S. J. Culley returned Tuesday from his southern Idaho ranch. The hottest spring weather known for 40 years in that section was followed by showers, and crop prospects are fairly good.

After the Grasshoppers

Max M. Reeher, government "bug man" and grasshopper specialist, is up in the mountains helping the farmers to abate the grasshopper pest.

Mr. Reeher's official title is scientific assistant with the United States Bureau of Entomology. He works in connection with the Oregon State College. He will be in this neighborhood until Saturday, demonstrating the use of poison bait for 'hoppers.

The best formula for poison bait is given as follows:

Twenty-five pounds of bran, one pound of Paris green or white arsenic, one-half pound of salt, four to six lemons or one ounce of lemon extract, two quarts of low grade molasses or syrup; water to make a crumbly meal.
