Just a-Fording Around

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. O'Harra returned Friday from a tour of the northern country in their Ford car. They traveled some 600 miles and had a most delightful outing. They visited their daughter, Mrs. Stella Kennedy, at Priest River, Idaho; Frank Knowlton at Spokane, and Mrs. Erven O'Harra at Newport, Washington.

The County Will Build It

"We will build, and that means grade and gravel, a road 15 miles in length from Pendleton to Pilot Rock, out of Umatilla county funds," announced Judge C. H. Marsh while at Portland, to the "Those Who Come and Go" reporter of the Oregonian. "J. N. Burgess, who will succeed W. L. Thompson on the state highway commission, lives at Pilot Rock and uses the road to Pendleton twice a day. This road is part of the Oregon-Washington highway and is on the state road program, but we intend building it ourselves so that other counties cannot say that Mr. Burgess is using his position to build a road to his own town. We don't have to do this, for the states should build it, the same as the Pacific highway, or any other highway, but we intend forestalling criticism—that's all."
