Mrs. J. M. Ashworth has been quite ill the past week with a heavy cold.

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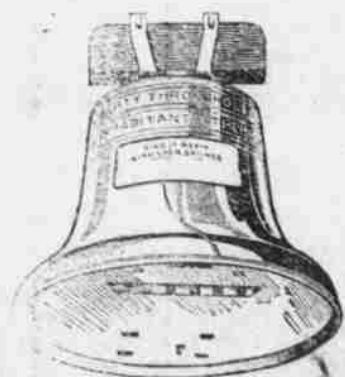
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
