

ORDINANCE NO. 202.

AN ORDINANCE providing for the issuance of City of Weston Water Bonds in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purpose of providing funds for the payment of the costs of repairs and improvements of the water system of said City, providing for the form of the bonds to be issued and the coupons attached thereto, ratifying, approving and confirming the sale of said bonds heretofore made, providing for the execution and delivery thereof and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, under and pursuant to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Weston a special city election was regularly called and held therein on the 4th day of May, 1929, at which election the Council of said City was authorized and empowered to issue and sell negotiable coupon bonds of the City in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purpose of providing funds for the payment of the costs of repairs and improvements to the water system of said City; and

WHEREAS, no bonds have been heretofore issued for said purpose and in order to procure the requisite funds herefor it now becomes necessary to issue and sell bonds under and pursuant to said authorization in said sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000); now, therefore,

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF WESTON, OREGON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the City of Weston do issue bonds in the name of and under the corporate seal of said City in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), said bonds to be in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), numbered from 1 upwards, to be dated June 1, 1929, and to mature absolutely without option of prior redemption June 1, 1930, to bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st days of June and December in each year, both principal and interest to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City, said bonds to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder of said City, who shall affix the corporate seal of the City thereto, whereby the City of Weston shall be held in substance and effect to undertake and promise in consideration of the premises to pay to the bearer of each of said bonds at the respective maturities thereof the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States, together with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of interest hereby determined by said Council, to-wit, six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually as provided in said coupons which bonds shall be known as "City of Weston Water Bonds," the interest on said bonds being represented by coupons annexed thereto which said coupons shall bear the fac-simile engraved signatures of said Mayor and City Recorder.

SECTION 2. That said City of Weston Water Bonds and the coupons attached thereto shall be in substantially the following form, to-wit:

THE CITY OF WESTON, Umatilla County, Oregon, for value received, hereby promises to pay to bearer the sum of

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

on the first day of June 1930, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent (6 per cent) per annum payable semi-annually on the first days of June and December to the bearer of the respective coupons therefor hereunto attached upon presentation and surrender thereof as they mature, both principal and interest being payable in United States gold coin of the present standard of value at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

This bond is one of a series of five like and tenor, aggregating five thousand dollars (\$5,000) par value in amount, numbered 1 to 5 inclusive, authorized by the voters of said City at a special election held for said purpose in said City on the 4th day of May, 1929, after due notice given, at which election an indebtedness in said

And it is hereby certified that every requirement of law relating to the issue hereof has been duly complied with and that this bond is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the Constitution or laws of the State of Oregon or the charter of said City.

And for the punctual payment of the principal hereof and the interest hereon the full faith and credit of the City of Weston is hereby irrevocably pledged.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the City of Weston has caused this bond to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder under the corporate seal of the City, and the interest coupons attached hereto to bear the fac-simile engraved signatures of said Mayor and Recorder this first day of June, 1929.

THE CITY OF WESTON, UMATILLA COUNTY, OREGON, will pay to bearer THIRTY DOLLARS in United States gold coin of the present standard of value at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City for six months' interest then due on City of Weston Water Bond, dated June 1, 1929, No.

SECTION 3. That the sale of the aforesaid bonds heretofore made to Carstens & Barles, Incorporated, be and the same hereby is ratified, approved and confirmed.

SECTION 4. That the Mayor and Recorder be and they are hereby authorized and empowered and instructed to see to the proper execution of said bonds and to the delivery thereof upon payment of the purchase price thereof.

SECTION 5. Inasmuch as it is at the present time necessary to properly protect the health, peace and safety of the people of the City of Weston, that work be at once commenced on said City Water System, and in order so to do it is necessary to enact this ordinance in order to obtain the necessary funds therefor; now, therefore,

AN EMERGENCY is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall go into immediate force and effect upon its adoption and approval.
