Mrs. Iley Winn motored to Pendleton Wednesday for a day's visit. She was accompanied by Miss Rosemary Whiteman, who had terminated a two weeks' visit with Weston relatives.

Mrs. James E. McDaniel left Friday for Bellingham, Wash., where she will sojourn for a season with relatives and friends.

Mrs. J. D. Miller and family are enjoying an outing at the Clifford Metz mountain ranch. Mrs. Miller is in California, looking after various business matters.

Mrs. S. Thorsen and children returned last week from a visit with her sister at Tacoma.

Miss Anna M. Schott of Seattle is the guest of Miss Minnie Johnson at the Alick Johnson farm residence.

Some 50-bushel wheat in this neighborhood is a gratifying reminder of old times. Sim J. Culley cropped a fraction better than 52 bushels to the acre from 95 acres of the G. De-Graw farm. Ralph Saling had 51 bushels per acre from his 35-acre field lying just west of town. The Key-Johnson-Schrimpf outfit is reported to be harvesting around 50 bushels from the old McKinnon place, now owned and farmed by Joe Key.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. McKnight of Fresno, Calif., and Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Dague of Walla Walla were guests this week at the Frank Snider home.

J. M. Bannister had a 36-bushel yield of good wheat from his holdings on the Richmond place west of town.

Spring-sown wheat on the Price homestead north of town averaged 35 bushels per acre and tested 61 pounds. The J. N. York outfit is now at work in the fall wheat, which is making 45 bushels or better.

Mrs. George Carmichael is visiting her son and daughter at the Carmichael farm. George himself will be over from Walla Walla in a day or two to see how the harvest is going. He is fast regaining his health.

J. N. York cropped 2567 sacks of No. 1 wheat from the J. R. Killgore quarter north of town. This grain is of the 128 hybrid variety, and Mr. York regards it as about as good in quality as any he has ever harvested.

While cranking an engine on a combine near Belmont, Wash., Lester Vaughn was struck in the face by the crank handle, which penetrated his chin. A serious wound was inflicted and is causing him much pain and trouble. On the same ranch, a horse stepped on Ana Wagner's foot, crippling it so badly that he can only get about with the aid of crutches. While in the midst of the harvest season the accidents were a severe handicap to both these former residents of this section.

Local hunters are now oiling up the old scatter gun for the grouse season, which opens next Sunday, August 15. Beginning September 1, it will be lawful to kill deer. Both seasons close October 31.

J. C. Davis has purchased a half interest in 'The Pastime, which is now conducted by Davis & Davis, father and son. They have added another pool table, and announce that they will do all in their power to promote the pleasure of their patrons.

Swas-Te-Ka Campfire members remaining in town were entertained Saturday afternoon at the home of their guardian, Mrs. Sarah Rowland. The session was a social one and plans for the coming year were discussed. A dainty lunch was served by the hostess to complete the affair.
