

Carrying the Crops.

(The National City Bank, of New York.)

It has been well said that the portion of all crops which is not wanted for consumption until months in the future must be carried somewhere, and that it may as well be carried in the hands of the farmers as elsewhere. Indeed, that is the best place for it, if the farmer can afford to take the risk of further declines, and always subject to the obligation which rests upon the farmer as well as every one else, to pay his current debts with reasonable promptness. The whole business structure rests upon the expectation that men will do as they agree, and that the flow of payments in trade will be kept moving. Anything like a general suspension of the payments which fall due in the regular course of business, compelling merchants aud others to default upon their obligations, would make the whole situation so much worse that the farmers along with other people would be worse off because of it. Nobody is justified in refusing to meet his obligations when they are due because it will cause him inconvenience or require a sacrifice, for his doing is likely to hold up a string of payments and cause inconvenience and sacrifice to many people. Everybody should do his part to maintain conditions as near normal as possible. A farmers' conference in Washington last week resolved in favor of selling to meet the regular demands for consumption, and this is putting it very well.
