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HOUSE VOTES FOR IMMIGRATION BILL

Measure Would Prohibit Inflow of Aliens For One Year.

Washington.—The Johnson immigration bill, as amended to prohibit all immigration for a period of one year, was passed by the house. It now goes to the senate.

The vote was 208 for the bill and 44 against. Six members voted "present."

In the senate the bill will be referred to the immigration committee and action will be deferred until the committee has concluded hearings and investigated all phases of the immigration and naturalization questions.

A number of measures on these subjects are pending in the senate and it is regarded as likely they will be incorporated in the Johnson bill when it is finally reported to the senate for consideration. The attitude of senate leaders was that no hasty action should be taken by that body.

The Siegel amendment exempting brothers and sisters of aliens who have become American citizens was approved, 203 to 73.

Immediately after the vote was announced Chairman Johnson of the immigration committee issued a statement saying that the 1250 immigrants who arrived at New York Saturday on the White Star liner Adriatic had been sent to Hoffman Islands because of typhus among them and that at Gloucester, N. J., 11 aliens had been taken from a steamship suffering with typhus.

Farmers' Relief Voted by Senate.

The senate adopted the agriculture committee resolution directing the revival of the war finance corporations as a measure of affording relief to farmers.

The second section of the resolution, which as introduced would have directed the extension of liberal credits to farmers by the federal reserve system, was amended to make the desirability of such a course only an expression of opinion of the congress.

The measure now goes to the house, where a number of similar farmer relief measures are pending.

The senate agriculture committee continued hearings with a view to framing other measures for the relief of the farmer from the conditions brought about by falling prices.

House Repeals War Laws.

Repeal of most of the war-time laws was voted by the house which adopted the Volstead resolution for that purpose after two hours debate.

The vote was unanimous, 323 votes being cast in favor of it and none opposed. The house, before taking the final vote accepted an amendment providing for inclusion of the Lever food control act among the laws which the resolution would repeal.

The resolution, which now goes to the senate, exempts from repeal only the trading with the enemy act, the war finance corporation act and its amendments and measures dealing with the issuance of liberty and victory bonds.

END INCOME TAX PUZZLES

Aid in Preparing Returns is Promised by Commissioner.

Washington.—A county-to-county campaign by internal revenue officers to aid taxpayers in preparing their income tax returns was announced by Commissioner Williams to begin shortly after January 1 and continue until March 15, the final date for filing statistics of income for the year 1920.

Revenue officers assigned to the work of assisting taxpayers, Commissioner Williams said, will be prepared to answer all questions relative to exemptions and income. Mr. Williams declared that tax requirements for the next payments are the same as those for 1919.

Holland, Jugo-Slavia Break Relations.

The Hague.—Diplomatic relations between Holland and Jugo-Slavia have been broken off, it was stated here. Holland recalled her minister from Belgrade and has dismissed the Serbian charge d'affaires at The Hague. The action was taken as the result of what the Dutch foreign office terms "a long series of insults to the Dutch government."

Dr. Wats returned the first of the week from a business trip to Spokane, and soon left for Portland.

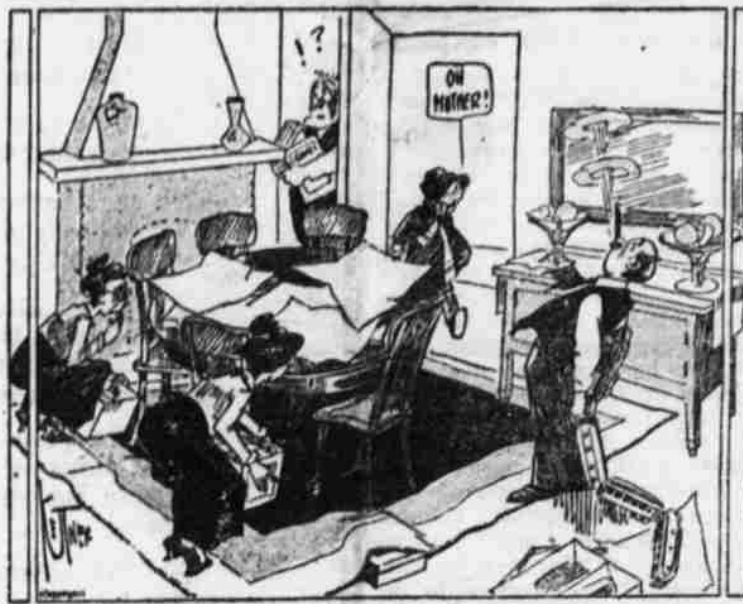
Mrs. Rogers Hostess to Club.

CENTRAL PORTION OF CORK DESTROYED

Incendiary Bombs Start Fires; Damage Is Placed at Millions.

Dublin.—The central portion of the city of Cork was burned to the ground Sunday night and other portions of the city were still ablaze.

The conflagration followed an ambush of the military at Pillons Cross Saturday night in which four persons were killed and many wounded.

Three civilians were taken from their houses and shot dead after the ambush of the military. Then the fires started. There were bomb explosions and firing also was heard. The populace was panic stricken. A dispatch from Cork said that the fire hose was cut, rendering useless the efforts of the firemen.

Two acres soon became a furnace. The front walls of houses were blown out with bombs.

Several blocks of buildings in the heart of the business district of Cork were destroyed by fire during the night, constituting the costliest destruction of property since the reprisals began in Ireland.

Early estimates placed the damage at between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 pounds sterling.

Cork, Ireland.—More than 300 buildings are said to have been destroyed in the fires which Sunday laid waste a great part of this city. Most of the fires have been extinguished, but there are occasional sporadic outbursts of flames.
