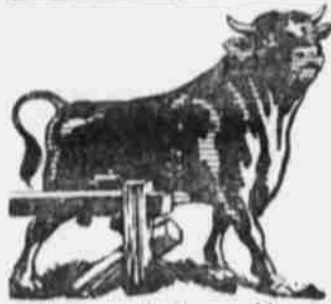

A meeting of protest over the increase in telephone rates was held yesterday on Weston mountain, with what result has not yet been reported. The mountain has three well-constructed rural lines, conducted by subscriber corporations. The rate per phone on these lines has been raised from \$3 per year to \$6. The service is practically the same as that accorded telephone patrons in Weston, where the rate for residence phones on a four-party line is \$24 per year. So far no complaints have been heard at the local exchange from town subscribers, and no phones have been ordered out, the increase here having been nominal. One of the telephone officials is quoted as saying that the Weston exchange never has "paid its way," and that the same is true of all smaller exchanges. Nevertheless, the company expended \$5000 in Weston a few years ago for betterments. The company, it is said, looks to its profits in the cities to make up for its losses in the country towns.
