At a point about a quarter of a mile south of the old Hudson Bay ranch the investigators found a concrete dam, used to divert water into irrigating ditches on either side of Pine creek, that a flying fish could not get over. The presence of this obstruction will be reported to the Oregon game warden. Another dam which fish are unable to negotiate was found on the Washington side of the line, and concerning this Mr. Albee will notify the Washington authorities. Pine creek cannot be restored as a trout stream, however, before another season. The work of Mr. Albee is appreciated at Weston, which community strongly favors his re-appointment.
