A smaller potato is desired, however, and this the mountain farmers will undertake hereafter to furnish. Messrs. Hall and May each brought home 125 pounds of certified Minnesota seed, which will be planted on Weston mountain.


And that's just about all our sporting editor is going to say about last Sunday's game, with the exception that Weston's outer gardeners dispelled the gloom to a certain extent by pulling off


