### Woman's Rights in Practice.

A lamentable state of things exists in Wyoming Territory, says the Washington Patriot, where women are accepted as jurors as well as voters. Recently a man was tried for his life for murder before a jury which included three lightning, and whenever she saw a On the third day, when all the testimony was nearly in, one of the females became ill and was excused. Another juror was sworn and all the testimony had to be taken over again for the benefit of the new juror. Finally, after a week's labor, and at cost of \$1,000 to the county, the prisoner was declared guilty of murder in the first degree. At this juncture, however, it was for the first time discovered that one of the females who had sat on the jury was not a citizen of the United States, of which fact the gallantry and modesty of the counsel for the prosecution, who hesitated to ask impertment questions of the ladies, had kept him in ignorance. It now became necessary to order a new trial, but the unhappy prisoner requested to be allowed to plead guilty to murder in the second degree, and be punished with imprisoment for life, rather than undergo another trial before a female jury. The request of the culprit was granted by the Court, and so the legal farce ended. These were the curious juo dical features of the case; but who can estimate at their proper valuation the unnatural social and domestic incidents connected with it? The incarceration for seven successive days of the jury, under the fatherly and refined charge of the Sheriff; the muttered curses and loud complaints of the deserted husbands and outeries of their bawling children as they daily besieged the court-room to catch a glimpse, however evanescent, of the neglectful wives and mothers?
