Changed Precincts.

Following we republish a list of the precincts which have been changed and the boundaries of the same. Let our Democratic friends take notice of the change, and be governed accordingly.

Camelina precinct was changed so as to include the northern and western lines by the farms of Wells and Allen's line of the precinct, instead of the Williams and Tualatin rivers, and the southern boundary by Parrott and Beaver creeks of said precinct.

Young's.—Name of the precinct changed to Eagle Creek and the former place of voting changed to near Phillip Foster's.

Pleasant Hill.—The eastern line of said precinct was changed to the section line on the west side of sections 12, 13 and fractional 24, T. 3 S. R. 1 W., and said section line to the Tualatin precinct.

Tualatin.—The western boundary of said precinct was changed to the western line of sections 12, 13, and fractional section 24 by the line of said precinct and the boundary of the Tualatin precinct for voting purposes.

Union.—The eastern line of said precinct was changed so that where the section line of sections 8, and 9, T. 4 S. R. 1 E., intersects the Molalla river, thence due south to township line South to the corner of sections 20, 21, 28 and 29 of said township, thence following the old line of said precinct as heretofore recorded.

Upper Molalla.—The western line of said precinct was changed as follows:—Commencing at where the township line intersects the Molalla river, thence due south to township line to the county line; and the east line of Marquam's precinct, be so changed from the original to the township line due south to the county line.

Canby.—A new precinct called Canby was established, the voting place to be at Canby, and bounded as follows: Commencing at the mouth of Parrot or Beaver creek where it empties into the Willamette; thence up the said stream following the north prong called Beaver creek, until said stream intersects the township line between T. 3 S. R. 1 E. and T. 3 S. R. 2 E.; thence south on township line to the corner of sections 13 and 24, T. 3 S. R. 1 E.; and sections 13 and 24, T. 3 S. R. 2 E.; thence west on section line to corner of sections 17, 19 and 21, T. 3 S. R. 1 E.; thence north to Molalla river; thence following Molalla river to its mouth, where it empties into the Willamette river, at the place of beginning.
