They have had a regular organized system of persecution, and have succeeded heretofore in driving their objects of assault either from the county or to the grave. They commenced on Dr. McLanglin and never ceased until that much abased noble hearted man was in his grave. They next started in on Mr. Daniel Harvey, and never ceased on him until his head was cold in death. This same crowd drove from among us the business office of the P. T. Co., simply because the company was continually annoyed by law suits trumped up for personal gain and black-mail. We now have a similar attempt made on the Lock Company. Ever since that Company commenced its work in this county, one individual has been continually harassing and annoying them with petty claims and assumed rights. They have been ready to pay liberally for all his legal or assumed rights in all cases, but still he is not satisfied. On the plea that the public are being imposed upon, he has given the Company any amount of trouble and expense, and even now, after they have completed a work which has added more wealth to our county than all the benefit this individual has been his long and eventful life, and which will pay into our county treasury more tax in one year than he has in thirty, he attempts to throw all the obstacles possible in their way, which he prosecutes at the expense of the county and people who have no interest in his personal affairs. He has gained the unenviable reputation that he is a standing defendant or plaintiff in every term of our Courts, and as such has cost the county more money than almost the entire population.

The Lock Company have just completed a most important work not only to this county, but to the State. They have spent thousands of dollars in our midst during the past two years, and all our merchants, mechanics and business men have been benefited by this. They are in a position to do much good for our county in the future, being men of large capital, and having important interests at stake, the wily necessarily have to bring into use their valuable water power, and prove of great benefit to our city and county. Yet we cannot expect them or any other corporation to do anything or invest their money here if our people will countenance these malicious and uncalled-for persecutions. Let us rather encourage people who have capital to come and settle among us, and not attempt to drive them from our midst by unjust persecutions. We need men of capital. This party and his aids have been here long enough to give us a just idea of their enterprise and ability to put our town on the road of prosperity. They have been a source of annoyance to it instead of a benefit, and we hope a stop will be put to this thing. Let us work together to advance the interest of the whole people, and we shall all get our just portion by the result which will be attained.
