RESOLUTION OF THANKS.—The following preamble and resolution explains itself:

COUNCIL CHAMBER, Feb. 3, 1873.

WHEREAS, Messrs. Hinckley and Warren, attorneys, were employed by this City Council to defend the cause in the case of the O. & M. Co. vs. the City Council and Assessors of said city; and

WHEREAS, Said attorneys after being requested to hand in their bill for professional services in that behalf, did on the 6th day of January last, send in a written communication to the Hon. Mayor and City Council of this city, and among other reported that they make no charge whatever for their services and interests of the city and behalf, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Council, in behalf of the people of this city, do hereby tender to said attorneys our thanks for their services in said suit.

The resolution and preamble were unanimously adopted.

ELECTION.—The annual meeting under the laws governing the Fire Department of this city will take place by the different companies as follows:

Hook & Ladder Co. on the 1st Friday in February, Cataract Hose Co. No. 2, on the 2nd Tuesday, and Fountain No. 1, on the 2nd Wednesday, respectively. At which time each Company will elect a Foreman, First and Second Assistant Foreman, a President Secretary and Treasurer.

The Foreman, President, and Secretary of each Company, including the Chief and Assistant Engineers, will constitute the Board of Delegates for the present year, commencing on the first Wednesday in March next.

The election of Chief and Assistant Engineers will be held on the first Monday in March.
