ARTICLE VII.-The meetings of this Union shall be held annually at the city of Salem on the-day -, and the first regular meeting shall be held on the second Friday in June, 1873, at Albany, Oregon.

ARTICLE VIII .- This Constitution, or any part thereof, may be annulled or amended at any regular meeting of the Union by a four-fifths vote of the members present.

The Constitution was adopted by sections, and elicited a lively discussion pro and con, but, as a general thing, harmony prevailed among the members. A chosen few objected to certain portions, but it was finally adopted as a whole by a unanimous vote.

The President and Board of Directors were authorized to establish a basis of representation, to be
