ARRESTED.—Considerable stir was created in our town last Saturday afternoon when a report was circulated that James M. Moore, a well known citizen of this county and old stettler here had been arrested on a warrant issued at Portland, charging him and Green C. Davidson, with crime of subornation of perjury. Davidson was arrested on the same day at Salem, and the two were taken to Portland on Saturday afternoon's train, where they were taken before Justice Anderson, who held them in bonds of \$2,000 each, which they gave, and were to appear the following Tuesday for trial. On Tuesday, while the trial was going on, the Sheriff of Multnomah county came into Court and took the prisoners, both of them having been indicted by the Grand Jury then in session. They were arraigned before Judge Upton and gave bonds in the sum of \$2,000 for their appearance, and given until to-day to plead. This charge grows out of the Curathar's land claim affair, and as we understand the matter, it is charged that these parties procured false evidence as to the identity of the famous Joseph Thomas, who now says that his name is Joseph C Nixon, of Mobile, Alabama. It is also stated hat Nixon's wife and daughter are now in Portland. As this matter is to undergo a legal examination, we forbear giving any fur-ther particulars of the affair.
