IN ME ORIAM. DROWNED-In the Columbia river, near Hood river, August 25th, 1873, Mr. Chester E. Clark, aged 26 years. On Monday evening just after tea Mr. Clark said to the family with whom he was stopping that he would take a sail on the river. He went out and nothing more was thought of his absence until it became time for him to open school the next morning, as he had some very intimate friends. across the river where they supposed that he had gone to spend the night. But when the time for school arrived, and he had not returned they became uneasy and at once instituted search for him, and upon going across the river they found that he had been seen on that side of the river by a lady the evening previous clinging to the bottom of an urturned boat and crying for help.
