Harvey lives with his son and had been trusted to come to town for some groceries he had purchased a bottle of whisky and from the evidence it appears that when he became exhilerated from imbibing, he and Jim had gon to the bank of the river where Jim also imbibed, not by purchase but by gift. The old man had not been nelsy and if he had been told that he was doing wrong to give liquor to an Indian and to go home he would have done it.
