BOARD OF EQUALIZATION .- The Board of Equalization has completed its labors for 1873, and returned their work to the various counties. In many counties they have made material changes in valuations, and their work being final, each county must correct its assessment in accordance with the action of the Board. We here give a synopsis of the changes made from the original assessment of this county: original assessment of this county: On agricultural lands they have added si per cent., making the total increase in valuation of lands, \$227,058; total valuation, \$1,362,348

The lands of the European Land Company were increased 150 per cent. making the Company assessed at \$74,-

making the Company assessed at \$74,-531 50, instead of \$29,832 50. The railroad was reduced \$4,216 50 for the assessment made by the Assessor. It was assessed first at \$6,000 per mile. Added 12 per cent. to horses, making the assessment \$105,860.

Added 2 per cent. to the assessment of cattle, making the assessment \$118,-

Added fifteen per cent to the assess-ment on swine, making it \$10,079. The telegraph which has never heretofore been taxed, was assessed at \$2,-150 or one hundred dollars per mile. The valuation of all property in Clackamas county will be exclusive of debtedness about two million dollars.
