FATAL ACCIDENT.—The Salem Statesman of the 26th gives the following account of a fatal accident which occurred ging, fiving near Glad Tidings : James Quinn, a lad of sixteen years, who re-sided mear Soda Springs, in Clackamas county, was accidentally shot while out hunting with some companions a week ago last Thursday, from the effects of which he has since died. The manner of the accident was extremely singular. It seems that the lad was standing and leaning on his gun in such a magner that his head was brought in range of the muzzle. While standing thus his dog came and jumpng up, placed his fore feet on the boy. e dog went down one of his paws struck the hammer of the gun, aising it far enough to explode the cap. The gun, which carried an ounce ball, was discharged, the ball taking effect just forward of the ear, in the edge of the hair. The unfortunate outh was two miles from home when the fatal accident occurred, whither he was carried in an unconscious state. In this state he lingered seven days, when he died, not having recognized any one in that time, nor seen a conscious moment.


