WOODEN WEDDING.—The many friends of Prof. S. D. Pope and wife, gave them a party at the Old Fellows' Hall, last Monday evening, in honor of the fifth anniversary of their marriage.

DROWNED.—A deck hand on the steamer Shoshone was drowned last Tuesday night. The boat got on a bar near Wheatland, and while the mate and Gardner were taking a rope to the opposite shore, the skipper was upset, and the latter becoming entangled in the rope, was drowned before assistance could reach him.
