Messrs, Carmichel, Barlow and Robb ns reported favorable on the estab-lishment of a road leading to Hubbard station. The Court approved the report and the road was ordered established. Owen Cutting was appointed supervisor of road district No. 19. The Sheriff was instructed and auth-

orized to refund, to all persons who had overpaid their taxes. An order was issued in favor of John

Giesey for overpaid taxes in 1872 for

Bills to the amount of \$82144 were ordered paid, of which \$57 was for the re-covery and burial of the body of Robert Stanfield; \$22815 from Justice Courts; \$176.52 for road matters, and the balance for boarding prisoners, paupers, and other incidental expenses. With the exception of one from Justice Matlock's Court, amounting to \$2145, the other bills came from Justice Burns' Court. The accounts above given amount to \$461.67, leaving the other expenses at \$36277. Out of this amount, the Sheriff's bill for per centage for collecting taxes was \$200.04, the Clerk's fees for \$11250 for work on assessment roll Thus it will be seen that the incidental expenses come down to \$50 23.


