WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 .- In the Senate Mr. Morton delivered a speech in reply to that of Schurz, yesterday, and argued against contraction of the currency or abolition of the national banking system, declaring that there was not currency enough in the country, and less now in proportion to the business and wealth of the country than there was five years ago. He cited Austria, Russia, Italy and Germany as countries of Eu rope which had made the most progress during the last ten years, in all of which the currency ranged from 5 to 25 per cent. below par. He denied that the enrrency system had anything to do with the panic, and insisted against any patent plan for the resumption of specie payment.
