Our Special Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19, 1874. The past fortnight has been one of great importance in the National Capital. During this short period of appointed three persons to occupy the position of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and such displeasure has been evinced by the prominent politicians and adherents of the party in power, that two nominations have been withdrawn and a third appointed. The first appointment was that of George H. Williams of Oregon.
