The mere notifieation confers no title to the donee, without the final proof. In view of ATTORNEYS AND COUNSELORS AT-LAW. the vast amount of valuable property, and the interest not only of the donce, but of all subsequent purchasers, particularly where the donee has sold before the issue of patent, and has since died, which are at stake, I deem it my duty to call the attention of all parties interested in these patents, whether as donces or subsequent purchasers, to the condition of their claims. If they have not received their patents they had better apply at once to their local land office and ascertain whether their notification and final proof have been forwarded to the General Land Office here. It will afford me pleasure to render any assistance in my power to obtain the patents here. This is a matter of so much importance to the people of Oregon that I would be obliged if the press of the State would lay it before their re-
